Riddle

Question: Two of our common religious practices, one that we perform daily and the other several times a year, are technically optional (reshut), but the Jewish people have accepted upon themselves to perform them regularly. What are the two practices?

Last Week's Riddle:

Question: We were all taught by our parents never to throw food. But there is a Biblical requirement to throw food (not blood) as part of several Mitzvot in the Torah. What food is thrown, by whom, and when?

Answer: The Kohanim are required to throw the meat of korbanot that are offered onto the mizbeach. In fact, there was a space ("lul") between the ramp ("kevesh") and the mizbeach to remind the Kohanim not to place the animal products on the fire but rather to throw them. See Pesachim 77a and Rambam Hil. Ma'aseh HaKorbanot 6:4.

Correction to Last Week's Riddle:

Question: There is a positive Mitzvah in the Torah for some Jews to eat neveilah (an animal that dies without shechita). This is a specific commandment, and not a case of pikuach nefesh. Do you know which Mitzvah it is?

Answer: Kohanim eat part of each chatat that is brought by individuals. If a bird is brought as a chatat, the Kohanim perform melikah on it (they slaughter it with their fingernail) which is not shechita, and the bird is considered to be neveilah. Yet the Kohanim are commanded to eat from it.
